POLICE OFFICER/PEACE OFFICER



JOB DESCRIPTION

Police officers protect lives and property. Typical duties:

- Respond to emergency and nonemergency calls
- Patrol assigned areas
- Conduct traffic stops and issue citations
- Search databases for vehicle or other records and warrants
- Obtain and serve warrants for arrests, searches, and other purposes
- Arrest people suspected of committing crimes
- Collect and secure evidence from crime scenes
- Observe the activities of suspects
- Write detailed reports and complete forms
- Prepare cases for legal proceedings and testify in court as needed

MINIMUM REQUIREMENTS

Police officers must:

- Be a US citizen
- Be at least 21 years of age OR reaching that age by academy completion
- Have a high school diploma or GED
- Possess a valid Ohio Driver's License
- Have no felony convictions
- Pass a drug screen, background check, and physical fitness standards

EDUCATION/TRAINING

Police and detective applicants must have at least a high school diploma or equivalent, although some federal agencies and police departments may require that applicants have completed college coursework or a college degree. Many community colleges and four-year colleges and universities offer programs in law enforcement and criminal justice.

Candidates for law enforcement appointments usually attend a training academy before becoming an officer. Training includes classroom instruction in state and local laws and constitutional law, civil rights, and police ethics. Recruits also receive training and supervised experience in subjects such as patrol, traffic control, firearm use, self-defense, first aid, and emergency response.

IMPORTANT SKILLS

- **Communication skills** to speak with people and to communicate details in documenting an incident
- Empathy to understand people in their community
- Good judgment to determine the best way to solve problems
- Leadership skills to help in emergencies
- Perceptiveness to anticipate people's reactions and understand why they act a particular way
- Physical stamina to pass required tests for entry into the field and to do the job
- Physical strength to physically apprehend suspects and to assist people in dangerous situations
- **Physical fitness** to pass tests to enter the field and keep up with demands of the job
